Generation YW Program



Provides life skills classes to at-risk teens to help them avoid the cycle of substance abuse (alcohol, tobacco and other drugs - ATOD).

- 221 teens in classes
- 211 teens in prevention counseling
- 344 teens in other prevention activities
- 468 teens attended ATOD presentations

YW Training Institute


A premiere regional training center that builds knowledge, skills and capacity to address the root causes of race and gender based inequities in new clinicians and the community-at-large.

- 98% are low income
- 100% have experienced some degree of trauma
- Veteran women and victims of crime receive free assistance



DONATIONS

91% OF BUDGET = DIRECT CLIENT SERVICES

- \$10 allows 1 individual to participate in one psychoeducation/group therapy session.
- \$25 allows 1 woman, child or family to participate in one counseling session
- \$75 allows at least 10 people to participate in a 1-hour training
- \$100 allows 10 women the opportunity to participate in group therapy
- \$150 allows 1 teen to participate in 10 life skills classes
- \$250 allows one women, child or family access 10 counseling sessions
